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What is the Oregon Progress Board?

- A state board
- Created by the Legislature in 1989
- Responsible for monitoring the state's 20-year strategic vision, *Oregon Shines*
- Oregon Benchmarks are the measures used to monitor progress toward the plan.



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What are Oregon Benchmarks?

- Over 90 societal measures of progress towards three *Oregon Shines* goals:
 - Quality jobs for all Oregonians
 - Engaged, caring & safe communities
 - Healthy, sustainable surroundings
- About a third of the benchmarks have county-level data and are shown here for Yamhill County.

48. CHILD CARE AVAILABILITY

Why this is Oregon's PROBLEM: In 2005, Oregon's child care providers had the capacity to serve 1.7 out of every 100 children under age 13, short of the target level of 2.5 per 100. Without a dramatic increase in the number of child care slots available, Oregon will not achieve its target by 2015.

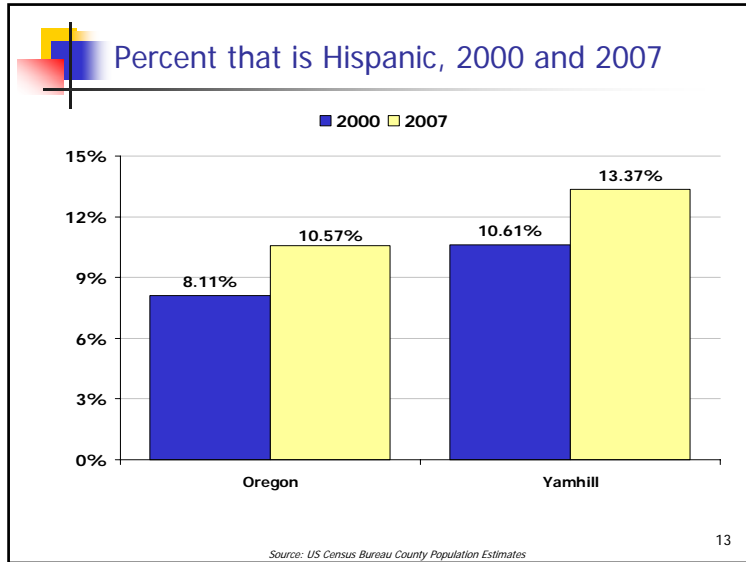
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Yamhill County's population

- Pink triangle = Urban county average

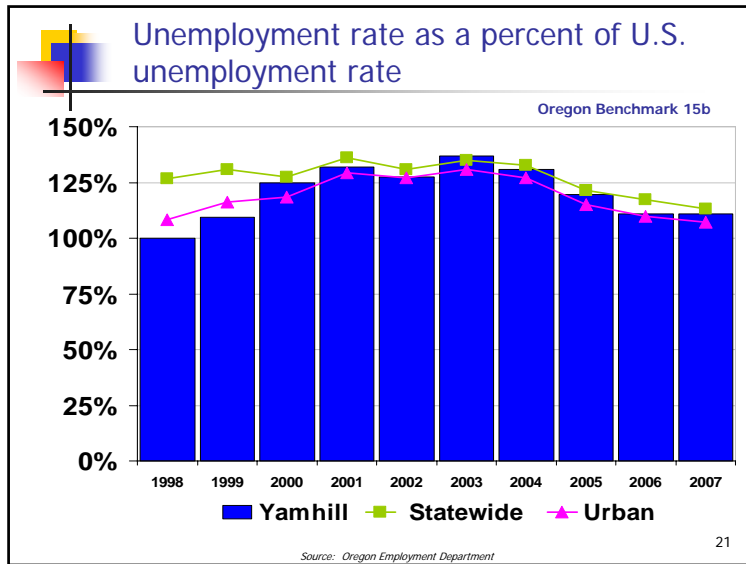
