This Year's Oregon Archaeology Celebration *"What's The Point?"* provides information about some of the oldest artifact traditions found in Oregon.

One of the oldest stone tool traditions in North America is referred to as the Clovis tradition and dates to about 13,500 years ago. The most distinctive Clovis tool is the Clovis point (also referred to as a fluted point). These points represent the first technological and cultural innovation of the people in the Americas who were flourishing at the end of the last ice age. Clovis points were made from obsidian, chert, or flint, and are large (about an inch wide at the base and up to 2 inches long) and fluted. Fluting is produced by removing a long flake from the stone's base toward the tip. The fluted area made it easier to attach points to the shaft of a spear that was thrown with the use of an atlatl. The atlatl maximized the speed and distance the spear could be thrown when hunting. Clovis points have been found in association with the remains of Pleistocene megafauna such as mammoths and mastodons. The first Clovis point

was found near Clovis, New Mexico in 1929, hence its name. Since then, these point types have been widely found across the western U.S., including Oregon. The theme of this year's Oregon Archaeology Celebration poster, "What's The Point?", celebrates the extended human history of Oregon, its earliest inhabitants and their technologies.

Oregon Archaeology Celebration events provide learning experiences for everyone. We invite you to join us in celebrating our heritage by participating in events that are offered this year. Please remember that archaeological sites are an important part of our heritage but they are also fragile. If you visit an archaeological or historical site, please treat the site with respect so that others may enjoy it as well. State and federal laws prohibit site damage or the removal of artifacts from sites.

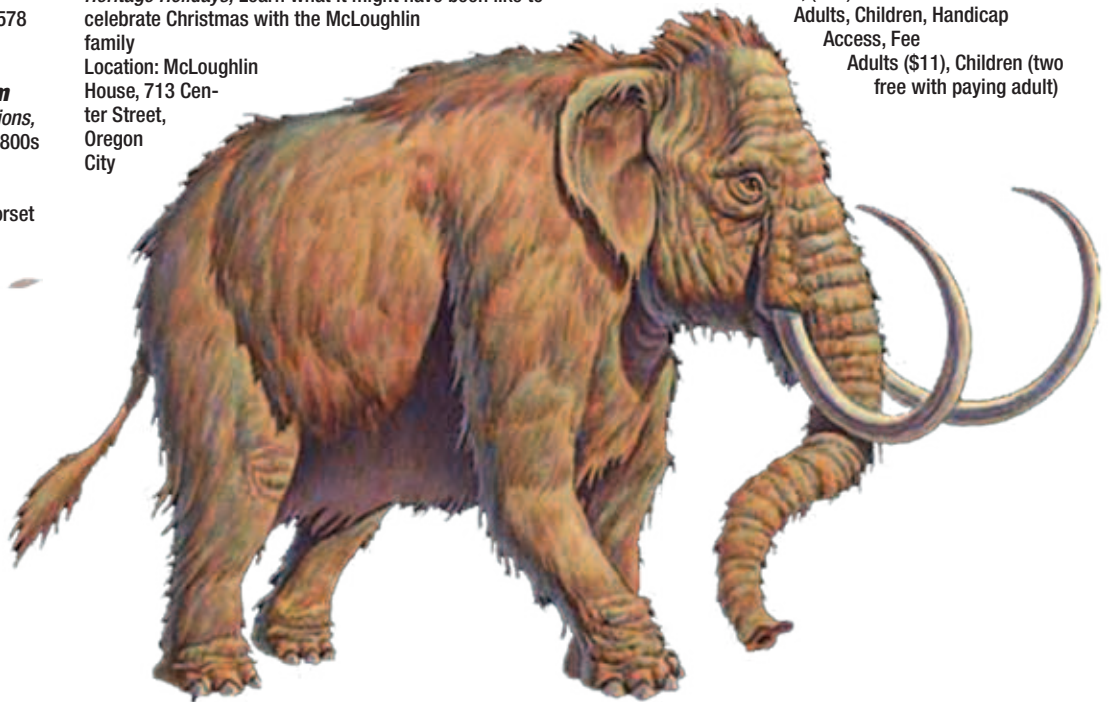

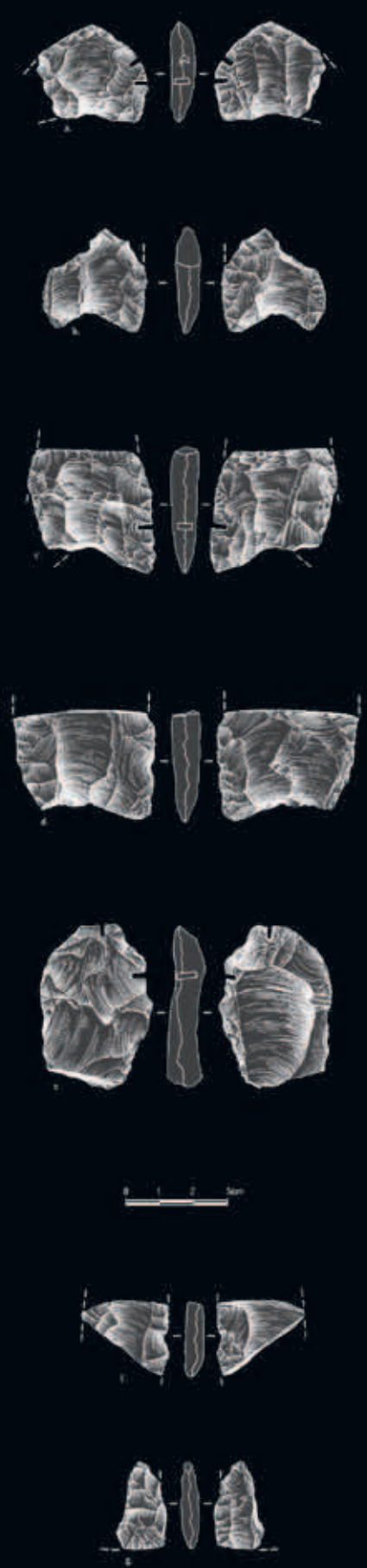

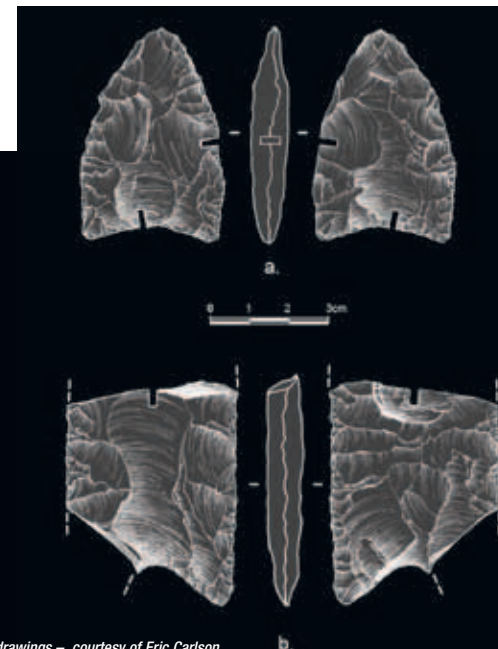
